



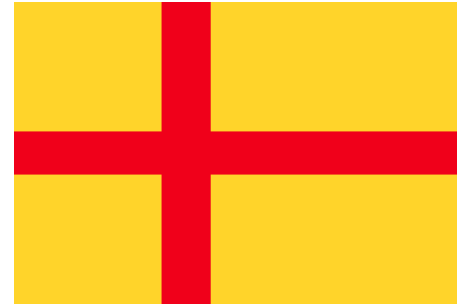

- **Platform** for joint Nordic research and research policy development in the Nordic countries
- Established by the Nordic Council of Ministers in 2005
- Aim is to **facilitate** cooperation in all fields of research when this **adds value** to work being conducted nationally
- Main stakeholders are the national research financing bodies in the five Nordic Countries
- **Basic funding** from the Nordic Council of Ministers and **additional funding** by stakeholders, especially the Research Councils in the different countries

Funding principles

- The Nordic financiers contribute to common pot of the programmes (usually funded 1/3 by NordForsk basic budget and 2/3 by national research financiers)
- Main applicant to be based in co-funding Nordic country
- International cooperation encouraged in all programmes
- All programmes open for participation of individual researchers from other regions (researcher mobility; guest researchers)
- All programmes open to research teams and institutions from other regions, provided that these document their contribution to the project budget

Nordic Centre of Excellence



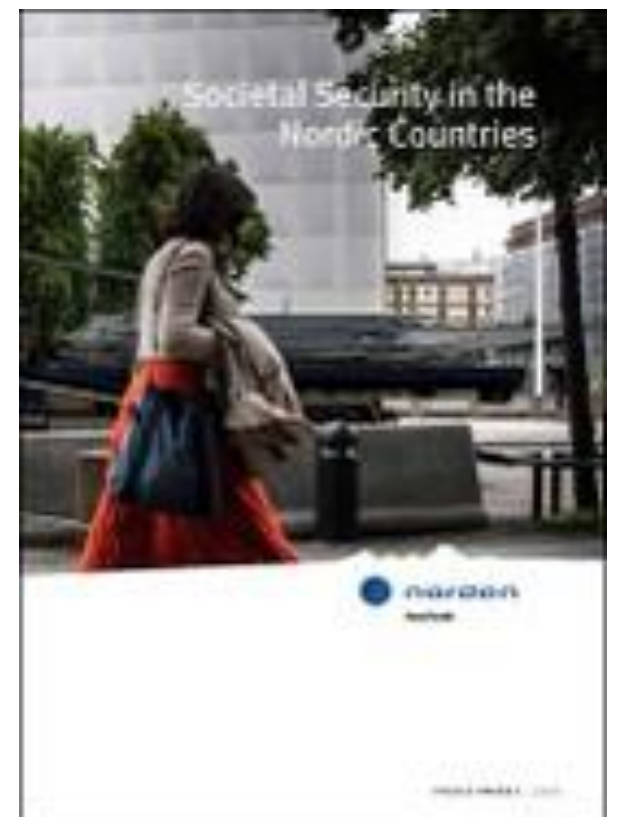
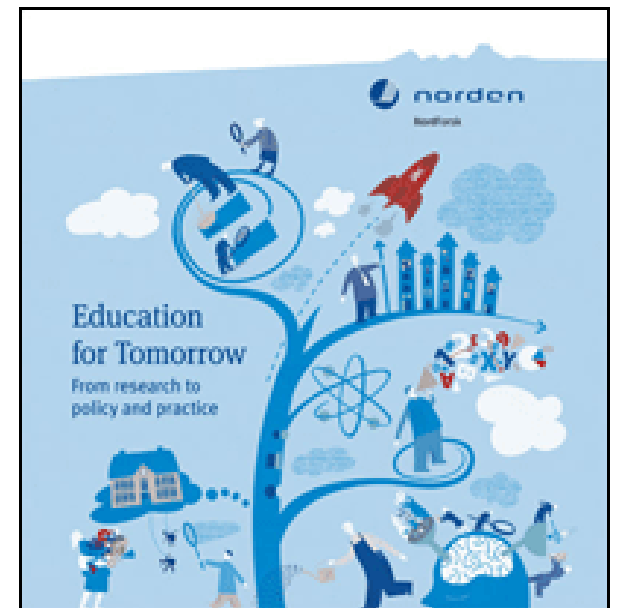
- ... are established to strengthen cooperation between outstanding researchers, research groups and research institutions within areas of priority for the Nordic countries.
- ... add value to research done in the countries and increase the impact of Nordic research in Europe and worldwide.
- ... work based on a single research agenda, joint management, coordinated researcher training, communication, and research infrastructure collaboration.
- ... are normally 5 years, more than 2,5 M€ Nordic funding
- ...have a standard procedure: Mid-term and final evaluation, regular meetings, communication, interaction with a Scientific Advisory Board etc.

Objective

- To develop new knowledge about and solutions for the many aspects of societal security affecting the Nordic countries.

Rationale

- The Programme builds on existing close Nordic cooperation in the area of societal security that has been strengthened through several political initiatives (e.g. the Haga Declaration from 2009)
- Higher degree of Nordic excellence and significant, targeted results can be achieved together by means of a common investment in a multi-year programme that links together existing research groups.

• Thematic Profile

The programme addresses questions of:

- vulnerabilities,
- resilience and capabilities for crisis management related to prevention,
- preparedness,
- response and recovery.

• Current budget

- 20 M.NOK are allocated from NordForsk
- 10 M.SEK are allocated from MSB in Sweden
- 10 M.NOK are allocated from DSB in Norway
- 0,5 M.NOK are allocated from RANNIS in Iceland
- 1 M.EURO are allocated from Academy of Finland

Status

- A two stage programme call for proposals for Nordic Centres of Excellence in Societal Security was launched in 2013.
- In June 2014 NordForsk board, based on the Nordic Societal Security Programme Committee recommendation, decided to fund two new Nordic Centres of Excellence
 - NordSTEVA – James Peter Burgess fra Peace Research Institute, Oslo
 - NORDRESS – Guðrún Gísladóttir fra Institute for Sustainability Studies
- NordForsk is working on the programme dissemination

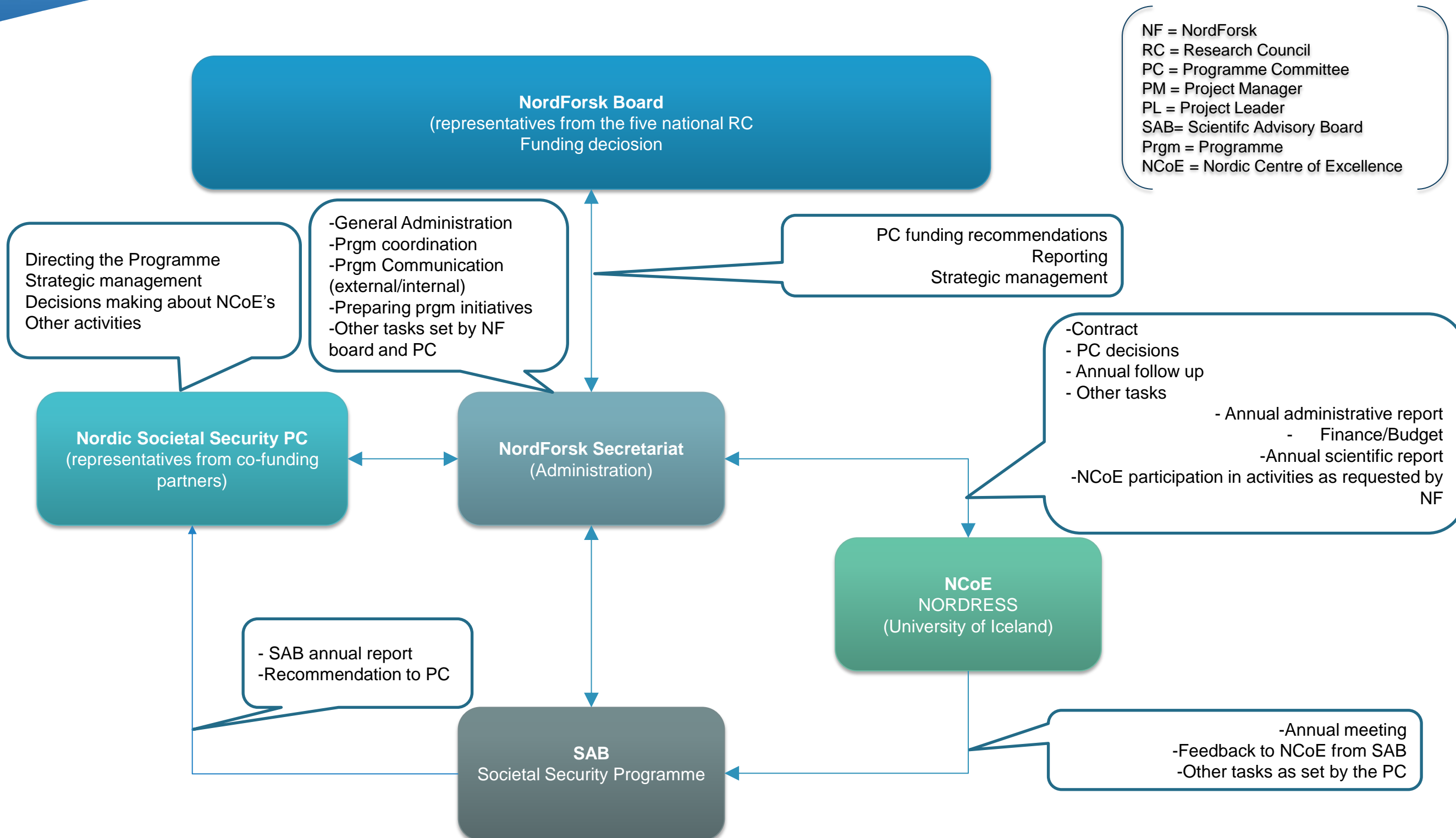

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Scientific Advisory Board

- Gives scientific advice to the NCoEs and the Programme Committee
- Contributes to the monitoring and strengthening of the scientific work as well as to the development of the programme as a whole
- Regular meetings with the NCoEs and the Programme Committee
- The NCoEs will report their activities to the SAB and discuss progress and possible improvements
- SAB reports to the Programme Committee
- Scientific Advisory Board for The Nordic Programme on Societal Security: 7 members: 3 experts for each NCoE and a chair

Reporting to NordForsk

Annual reporting

- Administrative report: budget, participants, any deviations
- Scientific report
 - Will be evaluated by the Scientific Advisory Board
- Annual reporting (calendar year) deadline 31 March, starting 2016
- Funding for the following next year will be paid after NordForsk has approved the annual report

Final reporting

- Three months after the completion of the project period
- Any unused funds shall be reimbursed to NordForsk
- Project manager is responsible for reporting

Annual Meetings

- Arena for discussion between the NCoEs, The Scientific Advisory Board and the Programme Committee
- The annual report serves as background material for the SAB meeting
- Active participation from the NCoEs is important
- First annual meeting in late spring 2016
- Can be organised together with other programme activities (dissemination, end-user collaboration)
